Meeting of the Marion City Council February 18, 2019

The Marion City Council met in regular session February 18, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. with Mayor Jared Byford presiding. Council members present were Darrin Tabor, Phyllis Sykes, Donnie Arflack, Dwight Sherer, D'Anna Browning, and Mike Byford. City employees in attendance were as follows: Adam Ledford, Melinda Gipson, Pam Enoch, Terri Hart, Brian Thomas, Ray O'Neal, and the city attorney. A public signin sheet is attached and made part of these minutes.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Motion by Mike Byford, second by Dwight Sherer, to approve the minutes of January 14, 2019 minutes with one correction of Browning suggesting city's intention to help reinforce zoning violations removing "giving more recognition to outstanding citizens". All voted yes.

Carly Towery, McKenna Myers, Macie Hunt, and Brylee Conyer, four eighth graders representing Young Leaders in Action were present at the council meeting. The four eighth graders representing Crittenden County Middle School will join nine other counties from across the region next month in a competition that challenges young people to create and amend a public policy to better their communities. The CCMS group chose park safety. They requested the City to consider changing the speed limit around the City/County Park. The Park Board would be responsible for setting the speed for inside the park. The mayor told the four eighth graders that he would check into this request and let them know.

Motion by Phyllis Sykes, second by Darrin Tabor to establish the position title- Police Sergeant for the Marion Police Department. All voted yes. This position, which falls between senior officer and assistant chief, will come with a 70-cent per hour pay raise. A copy of the position title is attached and made part of these minutes.

The city attorney gave the second reading of ordinance #19-01, entitled, "Amending Marion Code of Ordinance." Motion by Mike Byford, second by Donnie Arflack to adopt said ordinance with the vote being as follows: Darrin Tabor yes, Phyllis Sykes yes, Donnie Arflack yes, Darrin Tabor yes, Dwight Sherer yes, and Mike Byford yes. Motion carried.

The city administrator, Adam Ledford, provided the council with a copy of the 2019-20 appointments and said if anyone had any questions to please contact him.

The city administrator gave the mayor and council a brief update on the 911E. He stated parties met earlier this month to discuss how to proceed forward.

Council member Phyllis Sykes introduced ordinance #19-02, entitled, "An Ordinance amending chapter 31 Mayor-Council Plan: Meetings." Motion by Darrin Tabor, second by Dwight Sherer to amend the ordinance changing the council meeting time from 6:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

OTHER BUSINESS

Council member Phyllis Sykes asked the city administrator to check into getting microphones for the council.

Council member Phyllis Sykes inquired about the bad debt letters being sent out.

Council member Phyllis Sykes said she had residents questioning her about their high water bills.

Council member Donnie Arflack stated the City needed to advertise the Midwest property.

Council member Donnie Arflack asked if there were any updates on the City billing insurance companies for fire runs made by the Marion Fire Department. The City Administrator, Adam Ledford, thought an ordinance would have to be done.

Council member Donnie Arflack asked for an update on disc golf. The City of Marion Tourism Commission approved more money to proceed on.

Council member Donnie Arflack asked for a map pertaining to the fire hydrants that weren't working. He stated this would help the Marion Fire Department prioritize which dysfunctional hydrants should be repaired first. He stated not all hydrants would need to be repaired because of their location.

Council member Donnie Arflack was concerned with Industrial Drive having issues with hydroplaning.

Council member Donnie Arflack asked the city administrator when he would be starting on the budget. He stated late March.

Council member D'Anna Browning suggested having Rebecca Johnson draft a letter enforcing zoning regulations and having the council to sign.

Council member Mike Byford reported a water leak on Bellville Street.

Council member Mike Byford said the crosswalk was still not working.
